RECONCILIATION WEEK 2020

During a series of lunch times for Sorry Day and Reconciliation Week, many children joined Social Work students Ivy and Jo to make paper native hibiscus flowers. The native hibiscus flower is a national symbol of Sorry Day, to recognise the inspiring strength and resilience of people from the Stolen Generations. The flower is scattered across Australia, known for being a survivor, and the colour symbolises compassion and spiritual healing.

Children who made them on Sorry Day wore them as a sign of recognition for the Stolen Generations. We had lots of kids joining in, and it was great to see older kids helping the younger ones with cutting out flowers and threading the pipe-cleaners.

The 2020 theme for Reconciliation Week was "In this together". The flowers that were made during the rest of the week are to give to a local Peramangk elder, Mandy, who will be visiting the school in the last week of term. The making and sharing of these flowers is a chance for connection and understanding between Mt Barker Primary children and the Peramangk community, to show that we all stand together in solidarity, recognising the pain of the past and continuing efforts towards healing.

Mandy shared her own poem with the school about the Stolen Generations, which we have included below.

Nunga baby taken away

"Where's my mummy?" hear him say

"You taking me to Gonnyaland?"

Carried and fed by white man's hand

Growing up different never knowing Aunts and Uncles cousins growing

But they'll return when they grow old And tell their children of lies been told So it won't happen again you see The cradles outback that were left empty By Mandy Brown

Redevelopment News



If you missed the article in The Courier last week we are pleased to share that the initial concept plans for the capital works at Mount Barker Primary School for our upgrade have been released. The tender process to appoint a builder is underway and works will begin on site in term 4. Once the tender process has been completed we will be able to share further images with our school community and provide more information regarding timelines and implications for teaching and learning arrangements.

Plans have been reviewed in line with the transition of year 7 into high school by 2022.

Among the upgrades being considered for Mount Barker Primary School are:

- A new two storey building comprising 10 general learning areas and 3 serviced learning areas.
- A 3 general learning areas designed for inclusive learning for students with complex needs and 1 flexible learning area on the ground floor to be utilised as a sensory gym space
- New administration facilities on the first floor, including offices, staff facilities and amenities.
- General building amenities including toilet facilities and lift access on all floors.
- A new landscaped courtyard for open play and circulation.
- Demolition of ageing infrastructure.

We will keep you updated.

CoVid Restrictions for Term 3

Dear Families

One of the reasons for the delay in sending out the second newsletter for the term was due to the changing in restrictions and wanting to provide the correct information to our school community. We have received several communications from a state level and we have spent time translating them to fit our individual context.

Key information:

Drop offs and pick ups remain the same - parents are to drop off at the gate where possible
and not enter school buildings. We have noticed a number of parents, particularly in the
early years, that have started entering the building and congregating in small groups before
and after school. Our requests for minimal contact between families on our school site is
made with a view to keeping everyone safe.

CoVid Restrictions for Term 3—cont'd

- The guidelines for sick children are very clear. Children that are displaying the following symptoms are not to be on school grounds and will be sent home: Fever, cough, sore throat, fatigue, headache, runny nose and diarrhoea It is very difficult to distinguish between the symptoms of COVID-19, influenza and a cold. If your child has any infectious or respiratory symptoms please do not send them to school. They need to self-isolate and to be assessed by a medical professional. They may need testing for COVID-19. Children should not return to school until all of their symptoms have subsided or a CoVid screening/medical clearance can be provided.
- Assemblies will re-commence but will be students/teachers only. The classes that are presenting will record their items and share them via SeeSaw.
- Non Government Service Providers are allowed to recommence their visits to school. We
 have communicated directly with them and asked them to confirm dates and times of proposed term 3 visits and ensure their clearances are up to date. The completion of a CoVid
 Safe form is required for every visit.
- Volunteers in classes can commence and our usual screening processes are to be completed as well as a CoVid Safe form for each visit. All volunteers are required to sign in and out in the office. We would ask that you contact your class teacher and arrange a date and time for you to volunteer. We are allowing no more than 1 volunteer in class at a time.
- It is a year that normally our years 3-6 would be going on camp in term 3. Whilst camps are allowed to go ahead this is dependent on the facilities available being able to meet CoVid restrictions. We have made the decision that we will postpone the term 3 overnight camps and plan for our children to go in 2021. Our booking with Arbury Park will remain and the students will go for fully catered day visits instead. Further information will be sent home in term 3. The year 7 students go on an annual Leadership camp in term 4. We are currently exploring what options we have for this camp and will communicate with parents towards the end of term 3
- Planning for Term 4:
 - We are currently planning on Sports Day taking place in term 4. Sports Day is a complex and busy day and staff will not be in a position to enforce the currently 1.5m social distancing rules. As a results of this it is likely that Sports Day will be for students only unless CoVid restrictions are no longer in place.
 - Year 7 graduation ceremonies and celebration will go ahead and we will ensure any CoVid restrictions in place are adhered to. Dates will be communicated shortly.

We would like to thank our school community for their support during the last few months. Although we have been relatively lucky in South Australia, a global pandemic is not something that we thought would ever impact us in our lifetime. I would like to acknowledge all those who have experienced trauma and loss. This situation has bought up all sorts of issues but has also given us the opportunity to try new things, develop our resilience and focus on what is important to us as individuals, as family members and as part of a school community.
